

- November 18, 2023 Bird tools: We will learn about the natural tools that birds use (beaks and feet), especially when it comes to feeding.

# DONATION TO THE CHILDREN HANDS-ON MUSEUM OF NORTHWEST ILLINOIS

In August, our chapter donated this 14foot banner to the Children Hands-on Museum of Northwest Illinois (CHOM) located in Freeport. The 14-foot banner shows the actual size of two prairie plants (Big Bluestem and Lead Plant) with their extensive root systems. The purpose of this display is to reveal the amazing and massive root systems of native prairie plants and how they are often deeper in the soil than the stems above soil. This banner is so large it had to extend onto the ceiling! (special thanks to John Walt for helping hang it up!)

Illinois has the nickname of the "Prairie State," so NIAS wanted to use this tool to educate the visitors at the museum of what covered the state of Illinois in the past. Today, less than 0.01% of Illinois' original 21 million acres of prairie remains. We hope this can educate the public and support the preservation and restoration of existing prairie in Illinois. Prairies are important habitats for wildlife, especially insects, birds, and mammals. The banner was produced by the Tallgrass Prairie Center, which was established at the University of Northern Iowa. According to the Center, to produce this display, a 10-inch wide, 10-foot deep pot was used to grow the plants within a soilless growing media. The plant was fed for up to three growing seasons and then preserved and photographed for this display. Many schools around the country use this wonderful visual tool. It's important to note that in real world settings, the root systems would extend outward instead of only downward, but it still reveals what goes on under the soil that many of us may not realize.

We were also provided with educational posters so visitors can learn more about the benefits of prairie plants. Prairie plants and their roots provide superior erosion control, increased rainfall and runoff infiltration, reduced nutrient pollution that can lead to contamination of water sources, invasive weed control, and carbon sequestration that removes carbon dioxide from the atmosphere. Plus, prairie plants are beautiful!

Dust masks will be provided (or bring your own) since we raise considerable dust while rubbing seedheads across screens. All mint species will be processed in an outdoor workspace. 

# **OUR CHAPTER NAME: IS "AUDUBON" APPROPRIATE?**

In March of 2023 the National Audubon Society Board of Directors voted to keep its organization name as is. This vote was instigated by an increased societal awareness of the cruelty of slavery and concern pertaining to the actions and beliefs of John James Audubon during his lifetime. The decision to retain the word "Audubon" in the name has also generated consternation amongst a considerable number of the rank-and-file of the National Audubon Society, including many local chapters across the country.

The Northwest Illinois Audubon Society is a chapter of the National Audubon Society. However we are autonomous in several aspects, including choosing our own organizational name. At the annual retreat in July the Board of the Northwest Illinois Audubon Society began discussion on the implications of having the word "Audubon" in our name. Our regional office, Great Lakes Audubon, has been hosting meetings for area chapters who have also discussed the impact of the "Audubon" name. A few members of our board have attended these meetings.

John James Audubon (1785-1851) was not the founder of the National Audubon Society. The name was chosen in 1886 by George Bird Grinnel, who was instrumental in the establishment of the society, and had personal connections to Audubon's family. There are other organizations that have "Audubon" in their names which are not affiliated with the National Audubon Society. The Illinois Audubon Society is one such organization.

Currently the Board of the Northwest Illinois Audubon Society has no official stance on whether we should change our name, and if so, what our new name should be. The Board would like to provide opportunities for our membership to share their thoughts regarding this issue. There are several ways in which you can make your voice heard.

# 2023 ELKHORN CREEK NEST BOXES

While the Eurasian Tree Sparrows, our historic nemesis, attempted to nest in only 3 of our 9 boxes, House Wrens were relentless competitors, with 7 successful nestings, most of those later in the nesting season. Even with box checks every 5-7 days, the wrens were the dominant species.

In spite of all the wren activity, we had 1 successful Eastern Bluebird nesting and 3 Tree Swallow nestings, with 2 of those being successful. While the blackfly season was again mild and of short duration, blowflies were more numerous and perhaps the cause of the 1 failed Tree Swallow nesting.

Many thanks go to our nest box monitors, Kara Gallup and Mary Blackmore, for their numerous monitoring visits in March through September.
