
About the preserve owner



About the preserve

Woodland, grassland and riparian habitats are found at the 50-acre Silver Creek Biodiversity Preserve.

The 35 wooded acres include oak-hickory forest, a globally rare natural community type, and two branches of spring-fed Silver Creek. The north branch flows over dolomite, creating especially clear water quality and feeding areas in the rock riffles for migrating songbirds. Both the north and south woods are dominated by many species of trees and shrubs, but also contain abundant populations of spring wildflowers and ferns in the south woods. Shortly after entering the south woods, one will encounter a narrow drainage flow, containing plants characteristic of wet environments, such as Orange Jewelweed.

The 15 acres of warm-season grasses were established through the USDA Conservation Reserve Program (CRP). Various species of forbs (wildflowers) have been added over the years, diversifying these CRP plantings while establishing a "pollinator strip" adjacent to Leaf River Rd. Long-term plans include the re-creation of oak savanna habitat in these areas.

Over 300 species of plants and animals have been documented in those habitats, including over 100 species of birds.
